VGH STUDENT RESIDENCES -

Where We Lived: A Bit Of History

For those of us who lived in residence, we have fond and not so fond memories. This experience is foremost in lively discussions at reunions and without a doubt, cemented lifelong friendships. For more than 50 years there were on going problems with suitable living arrangements for students. This was not resolved until the 1950 residence opened.

The beginning:



Houses similar to this were rented to house the student nurses. This house was the residence for the Infants Hospital on Haro St. which was is shown next door.

In 1899, the School opened with eight students. The City Hospital, as it was called at this time, was located on Beatty Street, south of Pender Street, facing Cambie. When students enrolled, the expectation was they would be looked after by the hospital which was expected to provide nursing education, accommodation, meals, medical care and a meagre allowance or stipend. Strict rules of conduct

were enforced. Residence life for VGH students continued for the next 70 years.

The first residences were rented houses close by the hospital and within walking distance. There was no accommodation at the small hospital for students and female nursing staff. As was the custom of the time, graduate nurses usually lived at the hospital where they were employed. In 1906, VGH moved to its present site and for a short time, students were housed on the second floor of the newly opened Heather Pavilion.

A year later, the first wing of a Nurses Home – always referred to later on as the “Old Home” was opened on 10th Avenue and Heather Street. The second wing was completed in 1908. As hospital beds increased along with increases in student enrollment, there was a critical shortage of suitable residence rooms for students and nurses. In 1912, a house was rented at 640 West 11 Ave. and another on Ash Street to temporarily relieve this problem. No mention of whether students lived in these homes could be found and may have been used only for graduate nurses.

The Old Home was bursting at its seams so in 1915 a new student residence opened at the corner of 12th

ARCHIVE COMMITTEE REPORT 2015

2015 continued to be a busy year. Our major project was the review of our book collection. We have too many textbooks, duplicates and are not a library. The decision was made to no longer accept textbooks and to keep in our collection only those that pertain to VGH or the School. We have a few old and rare books which are of historical value and will be retained. An inventory was conducted and those books that did not meet the criteria were deaccessioned and removed from the collection. New repositories were found for some and the remaining discarded as there is little interest in old textbooks. The remaining books will be organized into categories. With the increasing interest in genealogy, we continue to receive requests for information on our graduates.

Work is continuing in the digitalization of our collections of photographs, documents, publications and museum items e.g. silver, pins, textiles, etc. to enhance virtual recovery from our website in the future.

Displays: Betty Anne Rogers resigned in December after 18 years as coordinator of the display committee. She has left a very well organized display collection which will greatly assist the committee. We welcome new members –

Cathie Cousins and **Jane Robertson**. As no coordinator was named, members decided to take turns organizing displays in Jim Pattison Pavilion which will be changed 6 times a year. This change will be evaluated in June 2016. Each year we feature the 50-year graduates in May. Other displays are topics of interest such as polio and pediatric nursing. An important display event is the Annual Luncheon where a selection of our beautiful silver collection, historical dolls and student uniforms are viewed.





50 YEARS – FEB. 1965**Alumnae Luncheon, May 2015 speech by Barbara Johnson Hestrin,***Good afternoon, Honoured Guests and Alumnae Sisters.*

First, some words of appreciation of our VGH School of Nursing Alumnae Association. I am speaking for our class of February 1965, to thank you for the work you do to collect and preserve the priceless archives covering the history of the VGH School of Nursing. Our School no longer exists but our Alumnae ensures that the significance of those 99 years will not be lost.

Thank you also, for this lovely luncheon marking some significant anniversaries. This has given us a much-appreciated focal point for our respective reunion celebrations.

Congratulations to our Anniversary Sisters, the Classes of 1945 and 1955, on your Anniversaries. You are giving us a major goal to work toward.

When I was thinking about what to say today, it occurred to me that each nursing class would have two sets of memories: those that were common to many classes, and likely include the very first day with the meet and greet in the Ballroom. Most of us were with our proud parents, and most of us were in awe of that perfect vision in a starched and spotless full white uniform who welcomed us as student nurses, namely Mrs. Beverly Witter Du Gas.

And I'm sure we all share memories of being barfed on, spat at, and cuffed by patients. But we also remember being thanked sincerely for small comforts given. That was what inspired us to go back the next day, for more.

Then there are memories that are unique to our particular class. We were young adults, part way on the road to maturity – some of us are still travelling that road, even as we age! We were becoming more aware of the world around us, and beginning to understand how much the future of our world depended on the wisdom and constraint of the world's political leaders.

We were probies when the Cuban Missile crisis happened, and I recall a large group of us gathered in our hallway in the late afternoon, feeling fearful and helpless because the world was on the brink of a nuclear war. Our wing was right above the instructors' offices, and when our distress became loud enough, Miss Gillies came through the door from the stairwell, took one look at our hysterics, and told us to get a grip. She said something like "Kruschev doesn't want to die either"....

Then, in 1964, each one of us can likely recall where we were on the Friday that President Kennedy was assassinated. I was in a group who were sent to spend a week



in a pre-school, as part of our "Paeds" rotation, in an attempt to familiarize us with so-called normal healthy children. It was a pretty awful week partly because it was North Van and it rained the whole time (we were assigned playground duty – the only time I ever used that Navy Blue raincoat we were told to buy). The pre-school teachers were not particularly taken with us and either ignored us, or gave us a bad time. The news about President Kennedy came around noon, and the staff were obviously upset, muttering amongst

themselves, but no one told us what had happened. We learned of it on the way home on the bus.

On a lighter note, we had a sweet and cheerful classmate who, when we were directed to clean dentures on B3 (remember B3?), opted for efficiency and collected all the dentures in a big pan, took them to the utility room and scrubbed them clean as a whistle. Imagine her consternation when she realized that she had no idea which dentures were whose!

We also worked together with the September '65 class to put on a very successful Harold's Night as a fundraiser. I don't recall how we managed to convince the Matrons that gambling in the basement of the residence was a good idea.

We also had our favourite teachers!

Who could forget Miss (Don't put that purse on the floor – the floor is full of germs!...don't self-medicate.... Keep your hair off your collar....Never ride in a vehicle with a full bladder) Fleming. Her approach to solutions and dosages likely saved countless of our future patient's lives, and I still freak out if someone puts a "dirty" grocery bag on my kitchen counter.

We also had Mrs. (Stop! O.S. is the LEFT eye) Hemming; Miss (you can read the chapter on male anatomy yourselves) Sim; and my personal favourite and first nursing role model who was way ahead of her time, Miss

(Let me show you what’s in my suitcase and I’ll help you avoid premature parenthood) Davy. Other favourites were Mrs. Copeland, a positive role model if ever there was one, Mrs. Turnbull, Mrs. Buchanan, Mrs. Burge, and Mrs. Kozier.

Our planning committee was curious about just how many years of nursing service were provided by our classmates so we collected a small bit of data. Just over 50% of our classmates responded – not bad for any survey! We found the total number of years from the respondents served was 1,085. The average was 31.5 years. We have some hardy souls who served over 40 years, and a few who moved on after just a few years.

Whatever we did in our careers, our nursing education and our lives in residence prepared us very well for our careers in nursing. We also gained skills that enhanced our lives whether we worked as nurses or in another profession or role, as some of our classmates have done.

For example, we gained skills in:

Analytical thinking: This was a hard lesson for those who could not figure out the cafeteria menu schedule. Particularly hard after a day in the O.R., when the entrée was liver.

Problem-Solving: Again learned the hard way, on rising (late) for 7 a.m. shift start to discover the dirty laundry bag still in the bottom of the closet and needing to find a classmate’s clean laundry bag to purloin some clean “blues” for the day.

Negotiating Skills: Ah – the long-awaited buzz from the matrons announcing a phone call – at last! He’s finally calling! Then the frantic run from phone to phone on every floor trying to convince anyone using a phone to give it to you! Now!

And finally, **Communication Skills:** Best practiced when arriving just a few minutes after curfew, in an attempt to

blame ...the traffic?...the weather?...car trouble?...and avoid the dreaded “9 o’clocks”.

I suppose every generation can say that they have lived through enormous changes in so many aspects of life, as well as in the field of medicine. But who would have dreamed, in 1965, that we would have the diagnostic and treatment tools that exist today? Could we have imagined that computers would become integral to our lives in so many ways?

We have also seen changes in the roles of women in society, with expanding career choices. But I am always delighted when I hear a young person say they want to “go into nursing”. What an apt expression, “to go into nursing”. This is not just our profession; it is part of how we define ourselves, and how the rest of the world views us.

There is no doubt that many women now enjoy greater rights and freedoms than ever before. Unfortunately there are still too many women in Canada and in other parts of the world who are not as fortunate. There is much

work to be done and even though we are retired nurses, we can add our voices and support to that work. We still have a long way to go.

A significant anniversary such as this one presents an opportunity to reflect on how very fortunate we were to have experienced our basic nursing education in, as Dr Du Gas describes in the title of her book, “The Best Damn School in the Country”.

As one of our classmates wrote in her response to our small survey, “The years have gone very quickly and nursing school seems like a distant dot in my past. It was however, the best choice for me and nursing has given me huge satisfaction, as a career choice. I feel lucky to say that I loved all the areas I worked in, throughout the years”. I believe that most of us would agree.

50 YEARS – SEPT. 1965**Speech given by Joan Kerr at the 2015 VGH/SON Alumnae Luncheon**

Good Afternoon to each of you and especially to my classmates of Sept. 1965.

A very special thank you to the VGH/SON Alumnae and the Luncheon convenors who work so very hard to organize and plan this day to recognize all VGH grads.

Today is a very special recognition to the 50 year graduates of 1965 and an honourable mention to the 60 year grads (1955) and 65 year grads (1950) from our school of nursing.

Before I say a few words on behalf of the Sept.'65 class I must take a few moments to recognize one of my dearest friends for the past 53 years. **Kathy (McCutcheon) Murphy.**

I met Kathy the day we entered nurses training. She was from faraway Castlegar with nowhere to go on her days off. My dad, "Father D" to Kathy delighted in telling people that I brought her home for dinner one day and asked if the family could keep her.

Kathy (McCutcheon) Murphy has been the President of our Alumnae Association since the year 2001 after being the vice-president for one year. She has been the glue that has kept the Alumnae together. Many of us over the years have added some "stick" to the glue but Kathy has kept us bound together.

She represents all of us so well and is forever speaking of the virtues

of the VGH-School of Nursing.

She is actively involved in many nursing circles in the lower mainland. She is the President of the "The BC History of Nursing" organization. She is the Gala co-chair of "The Registered Nurses Foundation".

Kathy is on the UBC School of Nursing's advisory committee. She is part of the Heather Heritage Foundation. Kathy is our representative and a wonderful advocate for all of our endowment funds at the VGH/UBC Foundation. She is fundamental in organizing a display at VGH for Nurses Week and is present every day to keep the lamp burning and to keep us front and centre. She represents us at numerous events, occasions and presentations. She has kept us in the spotlight so the Nursing circle will never forget our VGH School of Nursing. On behalf of all of us for your vision and your dedication -- *Thank you, Kathy.*

Now for our class of Sept.'65. What a unique and wonderful class we were and still are.

From the age of five I knew I would be a nurse. I told my Mum that I would be a nurse at the hospital with the tall smokestack. For the next 13+ years every time we drove down 12th Ave. I would see "my" smokestack and that kept my vision alive.

Finally I could apply (and although I never doubted that I would be accepted because this was my hospital), "THE" letter arrived in the mail. However, it was a provisional acceptance only. WHAT? Well, Dr. Parnell, the Student's Physician had reviewed my medical records and noted that I had suffered dermatitis in my elbow folds at the age of 13. Should this reoccur, I would be asked to withdraw from the program. Thankfully that didn't happen and here I am today.

I vividly remember Tuesday Sept 4, 1962 when 104 eager, enthusiastic, anxious young girls assembled in the Ballroom of the residence. We were greeted by Mrs. Beverley Witter du Gas in all her starched white finery (which I found out later took her 20 minutes every morning to assemble her uniform with the crisp white dress, the collar, cuffs, studs and apron). Students could do it much quicker. She thought it was very important to portray this image to her students.

She welcomed us and told us we would now be known as the class of Sept.'65. Wow! That seemed like a whole lifetime away. I think by lunchtime of that first day we were down to 102 and by graduation we were a class of 88.

We came from all walks of life – from Vancouver to Victoria. From Prince George, Penticton, Pouce Coupe, Powell River, Port Alberni, from Cloverdale, Castlegar, from Edmonton, Montreal, Washington USA. We met and lived and loved and worked together for three memorable years.

Why did so many enter the nursing profession? In the 60's there weren't many options for females. If you were in the University Program at High School you tended to study nursing or teaching. If you were in the General Program you might be a secretary or a hairdresser. Even back then, University was costly.

Nursing? Well our initial fee was \$196.43 which was the cost of our uniforms, text books, student fees and the year book at \$3.00. When we graduated we were given a statement stating we had received \$713.00 in stipend plus room and board for three years. Where else could we receive this education, plus the friendships, preparation for life, wisdom, experiences,

and confidence than from the VGH School of Nursing?

Our class experienced several one of a kind, historical events.

Friday, October 12th Hurricane Freda hit Vancouver with winds up to 125 km/hr. and damage up to \$10,000,000.00. Many students (but not all as some of us slept through the carnage) watched from the Library on the 8th floor of the residence as transformers blew all across the City. Trees down, power out. We were Probies and only had Saturday afternoon and Sunday off. The hospital generators were up and running so we were able to write our Saturday morning exam on Pharmacology from our dear Miss Flossie Flemming.

Everyone will always remember where they were on the morning of **Friday, November 22, 1963** when news buzzed throughout the hospital that John Fitzgerald Kennedy had been assassinated. **Saturday, January 9th, 1965**, we awoke to hear the news of a weather incident near Hope BC. It started with two earthquakes, an avalanche then a massive landslide of 47 million cubic meters of pulverized rock that killed four people.

On **Monday, February 15th 1965** we looked out of the Resident windows and saw the new Canadian flag flying proudly from the Vancouver City Hall. We were devastated when our favourite Sociology Professor Dr. Kaspar Naegele whom we had grown to love and admire suffered an untimely death at the age of 41 in 1965.

Sept.'65 – we were a cohesive, close knit group of young women with a common goal to become VGH graduates and registered nurses. We supported each other through thick and thin. We laughed together, cried together, worked together. We were a class who loved to sing. We held frequent, impromptu sing songs in the 6th floor elevator bay. We always ended the evening with our theme song “Moon River” just before the matrons came to do their rounds and room checks! We sang “Moon River” every chance we got and at our Graduation dance at the Commodore, the Dal Richards Orchestra delighted us all when he played it for us and we all joined in singing and dancing. Many of us were involved in the VGH Capers with the production of “How to Succeed in Medicine without Really Trying”. Four members belonged to the Tip Topper Club of Vancouver. Women had to 5’11” tall to be eligible for membership.

Under the organizational skills of Marlene (Wallace) MacLaren, we had a most successful, fun-filled and memorable Fall Fair. “A Night at Harold’s Club” exceeded our expectations and we raised \$1,200.00 for the Student Council.

Marlene formulated plans for a second daunting project. A VGH/SON Cookbook compiled by the students. To top off her social convening skills she staged a fabulous farewell party for Beverly du Gas when she left the VGH School to assist with Nursing Schools in India.

In **Sept. of 1964** when we became Seniors and earned the right to wear white shoes and stockings, the whole school did too and black shoes and stockings became history.

Miss Helen King, the Director of Nursing would often come to the South Lounge for an evening of bridge with the students. We all loved Miss King. She was an elegant, gracious English lady. When she retired the students had a reception in her honour. As a parting gift, the students presented her with an alarm clock. Just how fitting was that for a person retiring? Helen King told my parents “they” (the School) could train a competent nurse in two years but it was that 3rd year that changed a young girl into a woman and gave her the poise, confidence, knowledge and maturity to prepare her not only for nursing but for a productive and fulfilling life.

We shared wonderful joys and deep sorrows and look back on our training days as some of the best years of our lives. Our class celebrated our 50th reunion festivities during an amazing weekend at the Coast Plaza Hotel in the Vancouver West End. We picked up where we left off at the last reunion and reminisced, remembering all the wonderful, rewarding, silly and memorable things we did as the class of Sept.'65. We laughed and cried. We had our banquet with fantastic entertainment and of course the renowned reunion evaluation which is another unique happening of Sept.'65.

Sadly over the years we have said good-bye to fourteen of our classmates. All taken too young, - but fondly remembered at each reunion.

I re-read our Valedictory Address that **Delana (Smith) Sword** so eloquently delivered at our Graduation Ceremony. And I quote: “Ours is very much a story of people – people who through their guidance, their inspiration, their patience, their understanding and their love, have helped us become who we are.” Now, 50 years later we can look back on our careers and a life-time of activities, of growing, of maturing, of gaining wisdom. Our legacy and hope is that we have passed the torch on to others to whom our lives have touched and have been blessed.

We have always been pleased to be the Class of Sept.'65. Along with the Feb.'65 class, we were part of the largest class to ever graduate in the Commonwealth at 172. Even now, no matter where we go we are still proud to be known as a VGH graduate.



SHIKATAGANAI: It Can't Be Helped

by Sumi Kinoshita September 1960

Shikataganai: It Can't Be Helped traces one Japanese-Canadian family's experience of evacuation and internment during World War II. By recounting personal stories of racial discrimination relating to these events, Sumi Kinoshita tells the story of her parents' struggle to cope while raising a family in the British Columbia interior during the war. These struggles continued during the difficult resettling period following the war, as her parents were faced with the twin realities of having their property confiscated and their livelihood disrupted.

Including first-hand accounts from other members of the Morisawa family, *Shikataganai:*



It Can't Be Helped weaves a compelling story of tragedy, of loss, of retaining a sense of humour, and ultimately, of finding hope in the face of life's challenges. Sumi is a retired public health nurse. A second-generation Canadian, she was born in Victoria, BC in 1938. In 1942, when all people of Japanese ancestry became "enemy aliens" in Canada, her family was forced to move to the interior of British Columbia. She graduated from VGH in 1960.

Now a widow, Mrs. Kinoshita lives in Coquitlam, BC and has two daughters and five grandchildren. The story, *Shikataganai*, was born out of a heartfelt desire to record her family story for future generations.

RECOLLECTIONS OF RESIDENCE LIVING BY MARION BOYLE CLASS 1949

Do you remember as a probie living in the old home on West 10 Ave at Heather? Three lucky sets of girls had screened verandas off their rooms so they could sleep there in the summer. When the time came for the move to the New home further up the slope to 12 Ave, transport was provided for drawers. My room-mate had a drawer filled with shoes and the mover said "who do you think your are – Hedy Lamarr?"

My mother, who graduated in 1921, lived in the New Home too. Rooms had been built to accommodate one, but very early they accommodated two. My roommate had been an only child for 8 years and doted on by various aunties well as her parents. She did not look kindly on the arrival of a sister. When she came off duty, she would walk around the room, discarding pieces of her uniform such as the starched collar (that had to be run over at the crease with a wet finger to make it tolerable for the wearer). The last item to go was her cap. The frustrating part for me was that the following day she remembered where every item had fallen. One day I got up late, dressed in a hurry and dashed across the parking lot. Before long I was in agony, having put on her white oxfords instead of mine.

One summer evening during our porch days – a sing song had begun on our porch. Some-time later a phone message was received from higher up, to decrease. We decided there was time for on more song since the authority would not have known when the message was delivered. The next morning I was working on ward A – men's medical. The patient I was bathing told me – "Last night I heard the most beautiful singing".

VGH STUDENT RESIDENCES - Where We Lived: A Bit Of History

Ave. and Heather Street forever referred to as the “New Home”. This building is still standing today.

It was described as:

“The beautiful and comfortable home with its single bedrooms, quiet reading rooms and sitting rooms on each floor gives the nurse a chance to study quietly and live comfortably and should tend materially in improving their health both in body and mind.”

Alas, this was short lived and soon students had to share their rooms with a classmate. A library was opened in the New Home in 1925 and a year later, 200 books had been purchased. The money was provided by grateful patients and others. When the 1950 Residence opened a library was located on the first floor and later moved to the solarium on the top floor.

In 1919, the hospital had grown to 1200 beds, with a nursing staff of 47 graduates and 190 students. Living space for

students was once again critical. In 1921, 2 large wards in the Military Annex, which had been erected to care for soldiers wounded in WW1, were remodelled. This area was renamed the West Wing and 28 bedrooms and a sitting room were created for students. In 1929, the Military Annex was demolished as students were now living in wooden buildings, often referred to as “shacks” vacated when UBC moved to the Point Grey campus in 1925. The Mining building was converted into bedrooms and renamed Laurel House. Another adjacent building became West House. They were closed in 1945. Another building, Ellis house, located on West 13th Avenue was also used as a residence. Probably named after Kathleen Ellis, Director of Nurses and Principal of the School of Nursing from 1922-1929.

In 1945 a Nurse’s Annex was built behind the Old Home on 10th Avenue for 104 students, some of whom had been staying in both Laurel and West Houses. This building was described as safe and comfortable. Students were also placed in rooms in the Semi-Private Pavilion, later Health Centre for Children and in the Private Ward Pavilion. These were temporary measures until the new residence opened in 1950. It was to accommodate 550 students in single rooms. Until then, students were constantly scattered throughout the hospital in crowded and often unsafe buildings and by some, described as “slums. In spite of these deplorable and crowded conditions, graduates have very amusing stories of residence life and tell tales of all the shenanigans that occurred during these early years.

The end of an era: By 1970 nursing education changed and students were no longer required to live in the residence, although the majority continued to do so. Married students were now permitted to complete their program. In 1981, the traditional benefits of stipends, room and board were withdrawn and tuition fees introduced. If students opted to live in the Residence, they paid rent. In 1985, the School moved out of the Residence to a new building on 10th Avenue. The last VGH class graduated in 1991 and the collaborative UBC/VGH BSN program ended in 1998.




Laurel House. Following its use by UBC and as a student residence, it was opened in 1945 by VGH Alumnae as a tea and lunch room to raise funds for a clubhouse. After renovations in 1948 it became the Health Centre for Children until 1954 when it was temporarily occupied by the Women’s and Maternity OPD

In 2007, the residence was sold and converted to apartments with only the recognizable part – the facade on Heather Street remaining, but the memories remain in our hearts.

1950 Home

Helen Shore – 1946 - Leaves a Bequest to the UBC School of Nursing

As someone who shares a common ancestry with Florence Nightingale, it seems only natural that Helen would emerge as one of the most influential nursing leaders in the province. She has also been a generous UBC donor for many years and recently created an estate gift, which reflects her passionate advocacy for the School of Nursing.

“The role of a nurse, in my opinion, is to draw from science-based knowledge and develop a care plan to help an individual develop abilities to cope with and manage a health issue,” says **Helen Shore**, a UBC alumna (BSN 61, MA 71) and Associate Emerita of Nursing.

Helen was born in Calgary, Alberta. Her father and mother who were pioneer doctor and nurse in Bowden and Alix in northern Alberta had a great influence on Helen. As a young woman, she moved to Vancouver and graduated from VGH in 1946. After graduation, she was assigned to open a ward in the Infectious Disease Hospital at VGH during a polio epidemic. She then went on to be a staff nurse at the Calgary General and King George VII in Hamilton, Bermuda to gain experience.

When Helen returned to Canada, she completed a diploma course in Teaching and Supervision at UBC School of Nursing and then taught Nursing Arts at the Royal Columbian Hospital, New Westminster for ten years. She then enrolled in UBC School of Nursing and earned her BSN, which led to a position with the Metropolitan Health Services as a public health nurse in Vancouver.

It was during this time that Helen met **Trenna Hunter**, VGH 1939, Director of Public Health Nursing, and a former President of the Canadian Nurses Association. Both her BSN education and Trenna Hunter’s encouragement served to enlarge Helen’s understanding of

nursing. “The thing about Trenna was that she fostered public health nurses to demonstrate advanced skills, and she supported innovation in nursing practice. Working with her increased my pride and confidence.”

Although being a public health nurse was deeply satisfying to Helen, a phone call from Evelyn Mallory, Director of the UBC School of Nursing, soon changed the course of her career.



“To make a long story short, she offered me a faculty job substituting for a professor who was going on education leave,” explains Helen. “It was a great offer, so I thought why not?” At UBC, Helen met many academics focused on the challenges and needs of the profession. She presented nursing workshops on “Nursing Process” that were held throughout the province and later completed an MA in Adult Education, which reflected her new role as an educator. She was proud to join a committee of faculty members who would develop and implement a new curriculum for the 4-year BSN.

Today, Helen is recognized as a pioneer of her profession, both within the University and within the province. She hopes that her gift will help to highlight the School’s unique history and make it stronger: “Nursing has been a part of the UBC campus for 100 years now,” says Helen. “But we don’t really have a space that is suitable for our Bachelor, Master, and PhD programs or to recognize the important contributions our graduates make to society. That’s my reason for making this gift—to support fellowships, nursing history, and nursing space, all those things that will bring the distinction and recognition that is appropriate to a modern and progressive School.”

Memories by Jean Lewis Class 1940

- as told to Norma Guttormsson



Jean Lewis is a true daughter of Vancouver. She was born on January 31, 1918 when her father, Dr. Hugh MacMillan, a graduate of McGill, was practising Medicine at the Vancouver General Hospital. Her mother, Esther Mary Duff, who was born in Scotland, was also a nurse and graduated from VGH in 1913 along with 12 classmates. The family lived in Kitsilano. At the age of 7 months, Jean’s mother died and her great-aunt from Scotland came to live with the family. She recalls that a horse-drawn carriage was rented in New Westminster to meet the train in Port Moody to pick up her step-mother who had traveled to Vancouver alone.

Jean’s father was born in Canada of Scottish ancestry. He remarried his second wife, Dorothy Whall,. When Jean was 8 years old, she was raised by her great-aunt, “Great Old Auntie Jean”. There were four children in this second marriage – two boys and two girls. She remained with her Auntie Jean and her husband, Captain H. Newcomb.

Jean attended Magee and remembers her address as Beach Ave. Following High School, she enrolled in the VGH School of Nursing, graduating in January 1940. She fondly remembers an experience in the OR when she was a scrub nurse for an operation performed by her father and her uncle. They were engaged in a lively conversation reminiscing about a bear shooting when Uncle Lachie commented, “Are we going to do surgery or not?!”

Twelve students shared one large room in the residence where they were provided with only a bed and a cupboard for their clothes and belongings. She relates how comical it was to see these very modest ladies trying to change into nightwear inside their cupboards! However, Jean and four of her room- mates decided to move to the attic, although there were no windows - just the fire escape door. It was the fire escape that interested them! Jean met her husband while he was a patient in the hospital – Edward A. Lewis.

Jean and Ted were married on March 21, 1940 at Ryerson Church in her graduating year and raised seven children – 3 daughters: Carol, Susan and Peggy and 4 sons: Ted Jr, Bill, John and Randy. During those child-raising years, Jean worked full-time at the Children’s Hospital on 57th Ave. Her husband, who coped with injuries, worked at home as their “house-father”. All seven children graduated from Magee High School. Carol studied two years at UBC; John graduated from UBC and became a teacher, rising to Superintendent of North Vancouver District 44. At the time of writing, all of her daughters and two eldest sons have retired leaving only her two younger sons still working.

Carol lives in Kelowna, Peggy in New York, Bill in Calgary and the rest of the children are nearby in North Vancouver. Although Jean has limited vision – legally blind – she continues to live comfortably in her own North Vancouver condo with the assistance of her family and a live-in caregiver.

REMEMBERING -

J. Mirth A. Doyle

VGH Sept.'54 193-2016 Born in the family home in Victoria BC she said she delivered herself while her father was cycling to fetch the doctor. Thus began a life of challenges, met by an independent spirit. Childhood was spent in Cadboro Bay where her Mother ran a small dairy, with the children delivering milk by horse and cart through the Uplands before classes at the old Cedar Hill School. On weekends, after chores, they would look for treasure at Smugglers Cove. The girls enjoyed studying at St. Ann's, but one night as her father cycled home from his work as a waiter at the Empress Hotel, he was struck by a car and permanently incapacitated. The children went out to work, Mirth as an underage servant at the Cadboro Bay Beach Hotel. They needed to enlarge the family dairy operation in order to survive. A relative facilitated purchase of fifty-two-acre Section 61 Lake District on Old West Road around 1928, and the three teenagers walked the dairy herd out to Elk Lake along roads and trails. They lived in tents for the first two winters, among the coldest on record. Once again, Mirth became an underage servant, this time walking alone through the bush to and from the Hamsterley teahouse at the north end of Elk Lake.



By the 1940s, her Mother and two sisters opened a dressmaking shop, The Shamrock, on View Street, but it was WW II that steered Mirth toward her nursing career. She answered an ad for women to train as nurses at Esmondale Provincial Mental Hospital, was accepted and earned a certificate in psychiatric nursing in 1947. She was Head Nurse at Crease Clinic until 1951. Next, she became a prize-winning graduate from VGH SON in 1954, and then applied to McGill University, where she earned a diploma in teaching, followed by a Bachelor of Nursing in 1958. These credentials were sufficient for her to become a nursing instructor at Royal Jubilee Hospital in Victoria. There was no master of nursing available in Canada at the time, so she went to Columbia University, New York, where she earned a Master's degree in education.

Returning to McGill, she was instrumental in establishing a Master's of Nursing program where she taught as an Associate Professor until her retirement. She flourished at McGill, where she took a creative writing course with Leonard Cohen. Following her

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personal and professional interest in palliative care, she met Cicely Saunders in the UK, and Elisabeth Kubler-Ross.

In 1961 Mirth wrote: “If at any time during my life I have brought comfort or help to one person, then indeed my life will have been worthwhile”. In retirement, she continued to contribute to several community organizations. Mirth coped with several health problems throughout her long life. She died on January 16, 2016, just hours after making plans for her approaching 103rd birthday.

Harriet 'Hallie' Sloan C.M., C.D., B.N., Lt Col (Ret'd) 1917-2016, VGH 1940

Hallie was born in Winnipeg, grew up in Saskatoon and graduated from VGH in 1940. She served overseas in France with the 8th CDN General Hospital during World War II. After D-Day, she participated in the liberation of Belgium and the Netherlands, and chose to remain in the Army to



serve during peacetime. Nursing and teaching became her passions and she rose to the rank of Matron-in-Chief of the Canadian Forces Medical Services. After retiring from the military, she began a second career as a director of the Canadian Nurses Association. Her second retirement signalled the beginning of her tireless volunteer life sup-

porting the establishment of the Perley and Rideau Veterans' Health Centre, the Nursing Sisters' Association of Canada and fundraising to support education for military nurses through the Canadian Nurses Foundation. She was privileged to participate in several pilgrimages commemorating WWII Campaigns in Asia and Europe. It was her sincere wish to continue to keep alive the memory and respect for the military and civilian contributions made for Canada and freedom. In 2004, she was awarded the Order of Canada in recognition of her outstanding leadership for 50 years and advancing military nursing and patient care. She was also a Dame of the Order of St. John and last year as a D-Day veteran received the Legion of Honour.

Hallie passed away peacefully at home on January 21, 2016, her 99th birthday.

REMEMBERING - Lucille (Lucy) Giovando '41 1918 - 2015



Lucy was born on September 5, 1918 of a pioneer Ladysmith family. She graduated from VGH in 1941 and from UBC School of Nursing in 1942. Following graduation from UBC, Lucy worked as a public health nurse in a number of locations in B.C. including Kelowna, Kamloops and Cumberland. She then went to the United States where she obtained her Masters Degree in Public Health. She then moved back to B.C. where she worked for many years as a public health nurse, eventually becoming administrator of the nursing staff initially at the public health unit in North and West Vancouver, and subsequently at the public health unit in the Burrard District of Vancouver. Lucy had a wonderful sense of humour and an infectious laugh, both of which were most often directed towards herself. She was adventurous and strong willed, and loved life and people. She was particularly fond of travelling and visited, among other places, Mongolia, the Orient, South East Asia, Latin America and Morocco. In the 1950's she worked for a year for the World Health Organization in El Salvador, an adventure that provided her with many interesting memories. Lucy recently returned to live in the family home in Ladysmith, where she spent many happy months in the company of friends and relatives. Throughout her life she was comforted by her strong and abiding religious faith.

Lucy regularly attended our annual lunch. She died on December 13, 2015 in her 98th year in Ladysmith after a long and productive life. All those who crossed her path will miss her.
